NEED

BEFORE THE WORLDWIDE PANDEMIC, 25 PER CENT OF OUR STUDENTS WERE STRUGGLING TO MAKE ENDS MEET.

During the first wave of the worldwide pandemic and consequent to isolation measures and business closures, many Heritage College students faced growing financial challenges, and mental wellness issues as they strived to continue their studies.

A number of families in our community struggle to secure food and lodging. The additional costs of connectivity to pursue studies and access to reliable technology were, for some, not within financial reach.

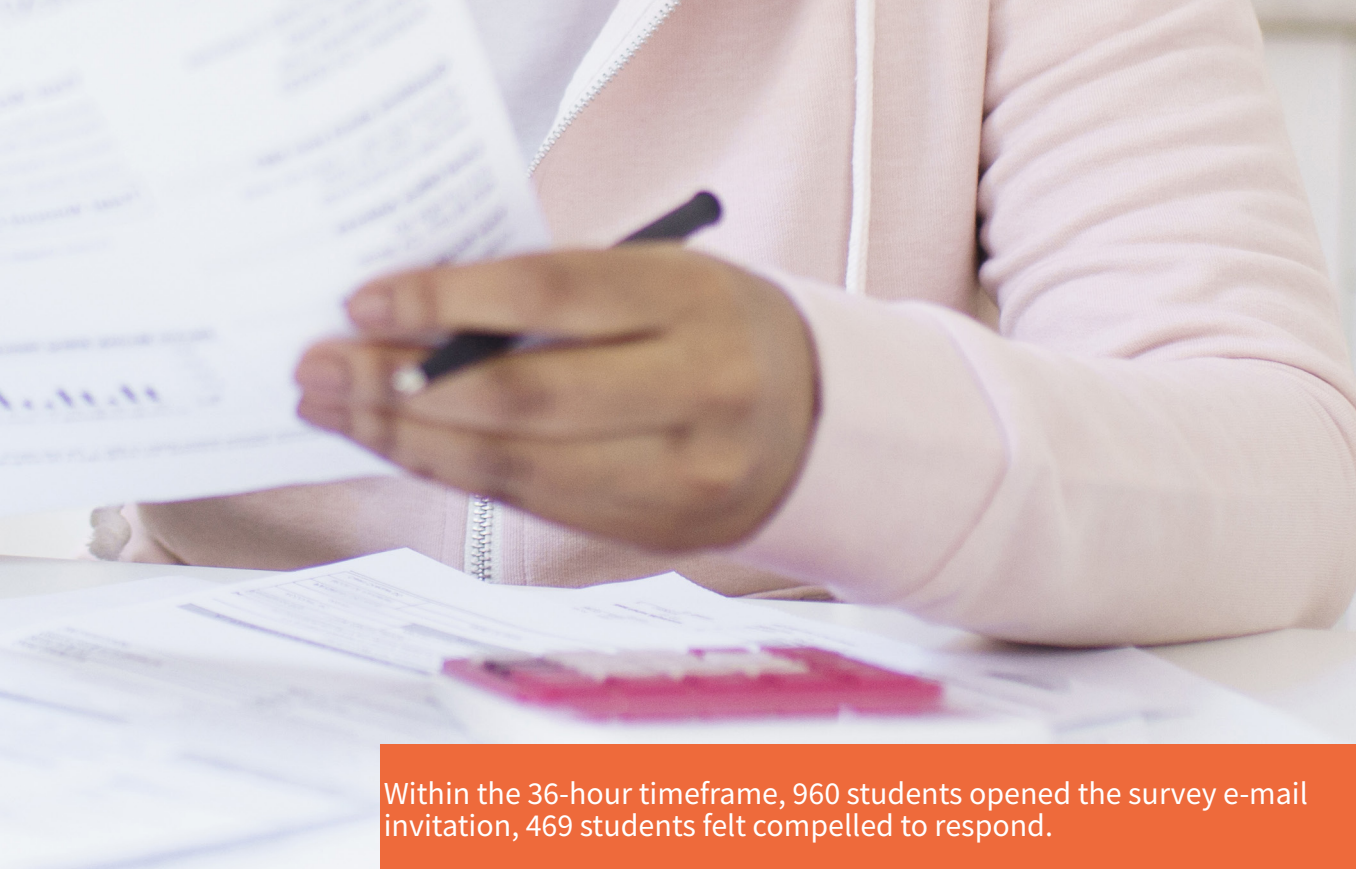
KEY FACTS

- Across the country, student distress is at an all-time high.
- Financial basic needs' insecurities can lead to anxiety and distress. Vulnerable students are at-risk of developing mental wellness issues and abandoning their studies.
- Provincial loans and bursaries (Aide Financière aux études) are not scaled to provide sufficient funds to cover all costs of housing, food, travel, books, equipment and fees.
- Supplemental financial resources for students such as part-time employment and family assistance may no longer be available.
- Housing costs are beyond reasonable expectations for many families and students.
- Too often, students are faced with having to make the difficult choice between attending classes and putting food on their table.



STUDENT FINANCIAL WELLNESS SURVEY

In order to confirm needs and in preparation of the Foundation's COVID-19 CRISIS FUND ASSISTANCE, 1,249 Heritage students were invited to complete a financial wellness survey. Survey analysis confirm projected need.



Within the 36-hour timeframe, 960 students opened the survey e-mail invitation, 469 students felt compelled to respond.

100

Close to 100 Cégep Heritage College students live on their own without parental support. Of those living with parents, 60 students declared living in a household with only one revenue stream (single parents.) Students rely on part-time employment, credit, and savings to make ends meet.

136

One hundred thirty-six have responded feeling challenged by the financial stress resulting in unseen challenges presented by the COVID-19 pandemic. One hundred and two students declared living with financial stress and struggling to make ends meet. Thirty-two indicate that limited finances are causing them distress.

179

Though students are taking actions to mitigate the financial impacts of the worldwide pandemic, many are not able to meet their financial obligations and basic needs. One hundred and seventy nine students reported that they have lost some level of financial support from their family, partner, friends and 97 students reported having had to use their credit to pay current obligations.

48

Most importantly, 48 students reported needing some form of assistance, 17 reported having used up all available credit and 28 reported wanting to speak with someone about managing their stress.

One hundred and three students reported being eligible for Canada Emergency Benefits and 99 students reported not being eligible.

68

Related to alternative e-learning, 68 students have had to purchase equipment to continue their studies online. Thirty students did not have access to appropriate equipment and 19 students are working on borrowed computers.

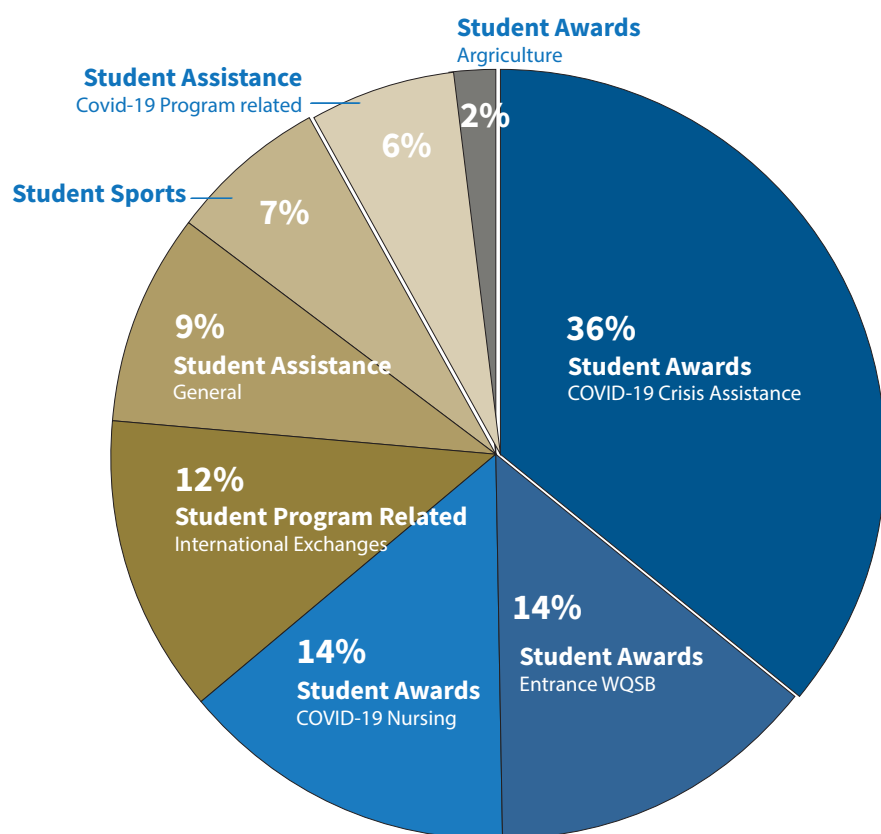

ACTION SUPPORT, RISE TO THE CHALLENGE AND OFFER RELIEF

EVENTS POSTPONED

Due to the College's closure brought on by the worldwide pandemic, the Heritage Bistro was unable to complete its schedule of educational dining experiences where gratuities offered by patrons helped to finance educational kits for the next-year's Hotel and Restaurant Management program's students.

Regrettably, Foundation's participation in the College Awards' Evening was also suspended. Resources were redirected to collaborative contingency measures and student assistance initiatives.

Similarly, our Major Fundraising Campaign was called to a necessary review.

Setbacks and adversity offered us the opportunity to unite and action unprecedented levels of community assistance.

STUDENT WELLNESS SURVEY

These uncertain times brought to light the many social inequities.

As student well-being is at the heart of everything we do, the Foundation ran a student wellness survey, which confirmed that a number of our community's families including our students were struggling and expressed despair.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

As demonstrated by the results of the Student Wellness Survey, our students were facing both mental wellness and financial issues. Several students' basic needs were not being met and therefore their ability to be resilient, adapt to changes, and be receptive to learning was greatly affected.

Our Foundation quickly recognized the urgency to assist students in need and rose to the challenge! Measures to lessen financial and resulting psychological distress were rapidly put in place. Grocery gift cards valued between \$150 and \$450 were granted to 32 students in need.

Special thanks to the Heritage College Faculty Association and the Heritage College Students' Association for their support and contributions.

Foundation donors and Heritage College community's solidarity made it possible.

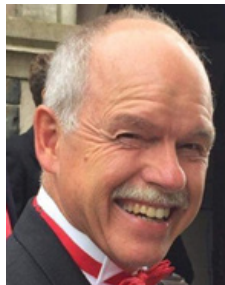
